

Optometry's Residency Model

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Profession of Optometry

- Function as Primary Eye Care providers
- Independent providers
- Held to the same standard as other regulated health care providers under Medicare
- Licensed to diagnose and treat ocular disease in all states
- Licensed for laser procedures and anterior eye surgery in some states
- Scope of practice is state regulated




Optometric Education

- Four-year doctoral level degree
- 22 Schools and Colleges of Optometry in US
- Approximately 7,000 students enrolled in 2015-16
- In 2015, there were 1,557 graduates
- Accreditation through the Accreditation Council on Optometric Education (ACOE)



Schools and Colleges of Optometry in the United States



Optometry

- Eligible to obtain license to practice at the point of graduation
- National Board of Examiner licensing body
- Scope of Practice state regulated
- Residency Certification is optional



Residency Programs

- Optional to practice Optometry
- Evolved to expand scope of professional practice and address specialty care in optometry
- First program in '67 in vision therapy at SUNY
- First formally recognized program was in Low Vision at Kansas City VA (1976)
- Programs required to be Advanced Clinical Training
- Required for some positions: faculty appointments, federal positions



Residency programs- continued

- Generally, one year in duration
- Requires beyond entry level clinical and didactic components
- Program funding by schools and colleges of optometry; Veterans Administration, military or other institutions
- No funding from Graduate Medical Education



Residency programs- continued

Primary focus of various programs:

primary care, pediatrics, low vision rehabilitation, ocular disease, refractive and ocular surgery, geriatrics, vision therapy and rehabilitation, cornea and contact lenses, community health, brain injury vision rehabilitation, and neurophthalmic disorders.



Residency Education

- 18/22 Schools have residency programs
- More than 200 programs
- ~400 residency slots available (~ 1,600 graduates):
 ~ 25% available positions
- 48% are in Veterans Administration programs
- 22% are residencies in optometry clinics
- 30% are in external institutions
- All programs required to have academic affiliate
- Accredited by ACOE



Residency accreditation

- There are 6 standards for accreditation
- Standards address:
 - Mission, goals, objectives outcomes, program improvement;
 - Curriculum
 - Faculty
 - Administration
 - Resources and Facilities
- Self Study and site visit are required for accreditation status
